I've been trying to create more of my own material for my students and friends to read. Recently, I came across NarrativeMagazine.com. From the About page is this statement:

"Literary readers are more than twice as likely as nonreaders to vote, to volunteer, and to be active participants of the communities in which they live. Reading encourages and develops empathy and emotional sophistication, logical thinking, clear expression of ideas, and the ability to comprehend complex and opposing thought systems.
